As promised, the Stewardship Committee continues to share some of the interesting highlights from the Zoom presentation, which they participated in, as hosted by Christian Kinard and entitled: Past, Present, Future Giving and Generations.

It is interesting to note that at no other time in America history has there been the possibility of a congregation being composed of five generations of individuals worshiping together. Yes, there are isolated cases where a newspaper prints a photograph celebrating five generations within one family, but these are still somewhat rare.

Obviously, advancements in medical technology, treatments, and improved living conditions have been a major contributor to extending life expectancies.

The five generation are defined as follows: Elders were born before 1946, Boomers born between 1946 and 1964, Gen X born between 1965 and 1980, Millennial born between 1981 and 1995, and Gen Z were born after 1995.
