Dear friends,

What difference does resurrection make in our lives? One answer to that question is very theological: resurrection means we have life after death. But another answer is breathtakingly practical: resurrection means that our limitations, our shortcomings, and our failures don't doom the new creation that God is bringing in the world through Jesus Christ.

That's an important truth to keep in mind. Almost anything worth doing for the sake of Jesus is bound to encounter pushback. There will be the naysayers. There will be those who doubt. There might even be those who undermine or stand in the way of our efforts. And sometimes it will feel like those folks have won and that our efforts have failed. But, to paraphrase Mark Russell from our Bible Study today, "we are called to be people who live faithfully no matter what - and who then entrust the results to God." God is the Lord over the outcome of our work.

Jed Koball, one of our mission co-workers in Perú, wrote recently about a major win by Peruvians who have been fighting the deadly practices of the extractive industry. For decades, communities have tried to bring justice to that situation where so many have suffered from lead poisoning and other industry-caused illnesses. Again and again they experienced failure. Who are they against this giant multinational corporations? And yet they continued to fight, trusting that God would bring something meaningful and just out of their work. This recent court decision is a great success on this journey. But the journey is not over yet. There is still much to do. I'm inspired by our Peruvian siblings who are living out the resurrection even now.

Verses such as Psalm 24:1 ("The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof") and Genesis 2:15 (where humans are called to care for the garden) underscore the responsibility to protect and appreciate God's creation.

In 2008, Manassas Church of the Brethren in Manassas, Virginia, won the National Council of Churches' Eco-Justice Program's Green Congregation Award for Children's Ministry for its Jr. BUGS program. In this congregation, BUGS means "Better Understanding of Green Stewardship," and the Jr. BUGS program teaches children and youth how they can help care for and enjoy God's creation. As they explore ways to care for creation, they earn badges with fun names such as "Wanda Worm" (for attending to worms and other critters that help in the compost bin) and "Lucy Ladybug" (for planting and caring for seeds in the church garden).
